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Class Objectives for Music 109 Courses

1. Students will demonstrate healthy, fundamental technique beyond the beginning level (including proper posture) on one or more instruments or voice.

Learning fundamental and healthy vocal technique includes a working knowledge of the physical instrument and how the different parts function interdependently. Specific topics will include breath control, posture, phonation, resonance and articulation.

2. Students will demonstrate performance skills beyond the beginning level including (as relevant) aspects such as good tone, accurate pitch accurate, rhythm, dynamics and appropriate tempo.

We will apply the above-mentioned technique to specific vocal literature, including literature in languages other than English.

3. Students will demonstrate understanding of the qualities that make a performance excellent.

We will explore and experience the art of performing, including topics such as complete preparation, stage etiquette, expression & dramatic presentation, nerves, collaboration, and other related issues. We will discuss how to integrate these qualities to cultivate musical excellence.

4. Students will demonstrate the ability listen critically and give constructive feedback, both to themselves and others.

We will discuss how to give and receive feedback effectively in the context of in-class performances.

Class Activities

- A. Vocal and physical warm-up exercises (10-15 minutes per class)
- B. Presentation and discussion of vocal topics listed in (5-10 minutes per class)
- C. Development of Musicianship skills (approx. 10 minutes per class)
- D. Group and solo singing (15-20 minutes per class)

Course Requirements

- Attend all class sessions and participate fully in all class activities, including **final exam**, and one **HSU Music Department** sponsored performance that features singing
- Stay current with all class assignments, including readings, and learning notes and rhythms for new repertoire
- Learn, memorize and perform **three** "**new to you**" songs from *The Singing Book*, 3rd **ed** in class on the scheduled days, one of which must be in a language other than your first language. (Note: You may choose any songs from our book, including those we do together as a group. You may also choose songs not from *The Singing Book*, 3rd **ed** for additional performances with instructor approval *after* you have completed the 3-song requirement.)
- Attend one Vocal performance sponsored by the HSU Music Dept. this semester. Dates include: October 9, October 21, December 4, December 9 & December 11. (See HSU Music performance calendar for full details.)
- Final exam: Attend one day of the Music Dept. Vocal Showcase program during final exam week on either Tuesday or Wednesday (your choice of day) between 4:00-7:00 PM (Exact time TBA as soon as the schedule is finalized)

In addition: You will be expected to read brief chapters from your book and participate in class discussions. We will learn and sing many songs as a group, work on vocalises (voice strengthening exercises) and practice sight-singing weekly in class. There are no written assignments for these activities but you are expected to participate fully, and work on building your skills. Regular practice is the key to improvement! ©

Attendance

Since this is a skills and participation-based class, attendance is **required**. Beginning on **Wednesday, September 7**, you are allowed **three** unexcused absences without affecting your grade. More than three unexcused absences will result in your grade for attendance and participation being lowered by one letter grade (such as A to B). If you miss class for an excused absence (one that you have discussed with me **prior** to the date of the absence), it is your responsibility to demonstrate that you have assimilated the relevant material prior to your absence. This may include singing songs and/or sight-singing exercises from our class texts. Note: Students missing **more than six** classes cannot earn a passing grade, **no exceptions**. *Also, you may not miss the scheduled performance days*. (See above under *Class Requirements*.)

Please note: Vocal warm-ups are an extremely important part of the process and will happen at the beginning of each class. If you arrive to class more than 10 minutes late, you will miss the warm up. Therefore you will be counted absent for the day. Plan ahead!
