- **Required Text and Materials:** <u>Alfred's Group Piano, Book I, second edition by E.L. Lancaster and</u> <u>Kenon D. Renfrow</u> (Additional repertoire may be assigned by the instructor) Notebook, Music Staff Paper and Pencil.
- Attendance: Attendance for this class is <u>mandatory</u>. Your presence in the class is absolutely essential! It is 40% of your final grade. Students will acquire and apply new skills on a daily basis. These skills are continually comprehensive; meaning new skills will require mastery of already learned skills. Students will be allowed **5** absences. After the second absence, the student's *total semester grade* will be lowered by half a letter grade *per absence* or five percentage points. Please inform me of any absences by email or in person

prior to class time.

If I don't hear from you, your absence will be unexcused. The excuse absences will be considered at the discretion of the instructor. Class time begins at the posted start time. Lateness is unacceptable. If you are late two times, it will be counted as an absence.

Course Description:

MUS 112, Piano I. Beginning class piano studies for music majors.

Music Department, 112 Piano I, Learning Outcomes Students will be able to demonstrate:

- 1. Construct and perform various five finger patterns and root position triads in all major and minor keys over entire range of keyboard.
- 2. Scales: One octave scales, hands together, parallel motion major keys starting on the white keys (C,D,E,F,G,A,B) and three starting on the black keys scales(Db and Gb). We also will work on scales in two octaves, parallel motion, hands together, up and down on the keyboard.

- 3. Progressions: Perform progression of I-V7-I chords in all major keys, hands together. Learning primary chords in all major keys. Progression I-IV6/4-I-V6/5-I.
- 4. Harmonization: Improvise simple accompaniment on given melody using mostly I, IV and V chords, and their inversions.
- 5. Repertoire: Solo Piano Pieces by L. Mozart, B. Bartok and arrangements by E.L.Lancaster.
- 6. Sight read simple solo and ensemble (duet) repertoire.
