Course Information

Course Description

MUS 317 is a continuation of MUS 316 (Ear Training III). The aim of this course is to further develop skill in the aural comprehension of music. We will approach the task from several angles, including performance of rhythms, melodies, and keyboard exercises as well as dictations of rhythms, melodies, and harmonic progressions.

In Ear Training IV, we will work specifically on:

- Melodies that feature syncopation, chromaticism (e.g. chromatic passing and neighbor tones), and modulation to closely related keys.
- Duple/triple/quadruple divisions of the beat, 2 against 3, mixed meters, hemiola, and reading at very slow tempi
- Mixture, Neapolitan and Augmented Sixth Chords (+6th), and modulation through enharmonic pivot chords.

Pre- and Co-requisites

The pre-requisites for this course are MUS 314 (Theory III) and MUS 316 (Ear Training III), while MUS 315 (Music Theory IV) is a co-requisite. Additionally, you should be enrolled in a piano class, or have completed the entire piano sequence (I–III).

Classroom Conduct and Course Preparation

Basic professionalism in the classroom is expected. This includes:

- Being punctual to class (see attendance policy for more details)

Ear-training skills develop slowly with constant practice. You should set aside 15–30 minutes of practice time *every day*. Your daily practice should include singing several melodies, at least one keyboard exercise, and at least one rhythmic exercise. Practicing these performance components will also reinforce your dictation skills. You are encouraged to practice with other students from the class, as this type of practice can be very helpful.

Attendance, Tardiness, and Make-Up Assessments

- Attendance in this class is *mandatory*. Students will be allowed *one unexcused absence* without penalty to their final grade. Each unexcused absence after the first one will result in the final grade being lowered one grade step (e.g. B+ to B)
- Students who arrive to class more than 5 minutes late or leave class early will be considered tardy. The accumulation of 3 tardies count as 1 unexcused absence.
- Missed assessments can only be made up for *excused absences* in extenuating circumstances (e.g. serious illness, death in the family) or Music Department events (e.g., competition, ensemble tour). Students will be required to provide some form of documentation for the absence (e.g., a doctor's note).
- Absences resulting from an unusual situation or other personal circumstance may be considered excused on a case-by-case basis. Please contact me as soon as possible to discuss your situation if this seems relevant to you.
- If you are absent from class, it is your responsibility to: contact me as soon as possible, provide documentation, get notes from a classmate, and print out any handouts or homework assignments from Moodle.

A total of 6 component grades will be taken throughout the semester. Scores gathered from the five main assessments listed above will determine the component grades.

- Performance Components: Singing (prepared and sight), Rhythm (prepared and sight), and Keyboard
- Dictation Components: Melodic, Rhythmic, and Harmonic

To successfully complete this course a student must have a total combined grade of 60% or higher AND must pass each component with a minimum of 50%.

Exams and Individual Singing Assessments (60%)

Both midterm and final exams will consist of a written dictation (15% each) and an individual singing assessment (15% each). The written exams will feature one or more of the following dictations: melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic dictations. For the individual singing assessments, each student will meet with me to perform a prepared melody and a prepared rhythm (assigned in advance), as well as a new melody and a new rhythm at sight.

- Midterm Exam: Written (Tues. Oct. 11) and Individual Singing Assessments (Thurs. Oct. 13)
- Final Exam: Individual assessments (Thurs. Dec. 8) and Written (Thurs. Dec. 15, 3:00–4:50)

Dictation Quizzes (15%)

Graded dictations will take place throughout the semester. Dictations will consist of one or more of the following components: rhythm, melody, harmonic progressions, and error detection.

Keyboard Exercises (15%)

You will realize assigned figured bass exercises at the piano and prepare these exercises in a variety of keys. I will choose the key at your performance. Keyboard exercises are to be performed for me in my office or at the end of class (as time allows) by 5:00 PM on the assigned due date. Early performances are encouraged. In preparing and performing keyboard exercises for this class, accuracy and the ability to think through the exercise is more important than playing quickly or in time.

Prepared Melodies and Rhythms (10%)

I will assign select melodies and rhythms from the textbook for you to prepare at home and then I will ask each student to perform one of the assigned exercises in class. I will decide before arriving at class who I will ask to perform each exercise. The purpose of these assignments is to encourage you to regularly practice the associated skills and to monitor your progress. Unless indicated otherwise, you will sing melodies with scale degree numbers while conducting, and you will perform rhythms with Gordon syllables while conducting.

Incompletes

A grade of incomplete will be given only if the following conditions are met: 1) Near the end of the semester a severe illness or other catastrophe makes completing the semester's coursework impossible. 2) You request a grade of incomplete as soon as you realize that you will be unable to complete your coursework. 3) You are passing the course when you request the incomplete.
