Course Information

Course Description

Comprehensive ear training correlated to MUS 314. Develop music reading and perception skills in studies through rhythm (traditional, 20th century), sight singing (traditional, 20th century), dictation, and keyboard.

The aim of this course is to develop skill in the aural comprehension of music. We will approach the task from several angles, including performance of rhythms, melodies, and keyboard exercises as well as dictation of rhythms, melodies, harmonic progressions, and periods. In Ear Training III, we will work specifically on:

- Melodies containing diatonic leaps, especially those within the tonic and dominant triads and the dominant seventh chord
- Subdivisions of the beat in simple and compound meters and syncopation
- Pre-dominant chords, six-four chords, secondary dominant chords, modulation to closely related keys, and periods

Pre- and Co-requisites

The pre-requisites for this course are MUS 215 (Theory II) and MUS 217 (Ear Training II). Additionally, you should be enrolled in a piano class, or have completed the entire piano sequence (I–III).

Classroom Conduct and Course Preparation

Basic professionalism in the classroom is expected. This includes:

Ear-training skills develop slowly with constant practice. You should set aside 15–30 minutes of practice time *every day*. Your daily practice should include singing several melodies, at least one keyboard exercise, and at least one rhythmic exercise. Practicing these performance components will also reinforce your dictation skills. You are encouraged to practice with other students from the class, as this type of practice can be very helpful.

Attendance and Make-Up Assessments

- Since this is a skills- and participation-based class, attendance is *mandatory*. Students will be allowed *two unexcused absences* without penalty to their final grade. Each unexcused absence after the first two will result in the final grade being lowered one grade step (e.g. B+ to B)
- Missed assessments can only be made up for *excused absences* (e.g. Music Dept. events, illness) or for serious/compelling reasons (e.g. death in the family). Students may be required to provide some form of documentation for the absence.
- Absences resulting from an unusual situation or other personal circumstance may be considered excused on a case-by-case basis. If this seems relevant to your situation, please contact me as soon as possible.
- If you are absent from class, it is your responsibility to: contact me (preferably before class if possible), provide documentation (when necessary), check with a classmate for any handouts, and check for any changes to the homework assignments on Moodle.

*In order to pass this course, your overall grade must be at least a D (60%) and you need to pass each performance component (i.e., melody, rhythm, and keyboard skills) AND each dictation component (i.e., melody, rhythm, harmony, and periods) at 50%.

Performance Grading (out of 100 pts each)

- Excellent (100): correct pitches, rhythm, scale degrees, and conducting
- Good (90): a few small errors that don't impair the flow (e.g. no hesitating/stopping)
- Above Average (85): errors impair the flow; on second try, student fixes errors on own
- Average (75): many errors to flow, pitches, and scale degrees; student can fix errors once pointed out by instructor
- Below Average (65): generally poor but exercise is still recognizable; student needs help from the instructor (e.g. provides notes, rhythms)
- Poor (50): exercise is unrecognizable, but some pitches/rhythms/scale degrees are still correct; student needs help from the instructor
- Very Poor (40): exercise is unrecognizable; student needs extensive help from instructor
- Incomplete/No attempt (0–30): student is unable/unwilling to complete exercise even with help from instructor; student did not complete the exercise (no show)

Unit Tests, Individual Singing Assessments, and Final Exam (60%)

You will be evaluated on the skills studied in each unit through a dictation test (or final exam) and an individual singing assessment (10% each). Each test will consist of one or more of the following dictations: melodic, harmonic, rhythmic dictations, and period identification. For the individual singing assessments, each student will meet with me to perform a prepared melody and a prepared rhythm (assigned in advance), as well as a new melody and a new rhythm at sight.

Unit #1: Individual assessments (Tues. Feb. 14) and Test (Thurs. Feb. 16) Unit #2: Individual assessments (Tues. March 28) and Test (Thurs. March 30) Unit #3: Individual assessments (Thurs. May 4) and *Final Exam (Thurs. May 11, 12:40–2:30pm)*

Dictation Quizzes (15%)

Graded dictations will take place approximately twice every unit. Each dictation will consist of one or more of the following components: rhythm, melody, harmonic progression, period identification, and error detection. If you are not in class when a dictation is given, you will receive a grade of 0 for each missed component.

Keyboard Exercises (15%)

You will realize assigned figured bass exercises at the piano and prepare these exercises in a variety of keys. I will choose the key at your performance. Keyboard exercises are to be performed for me in my office by 5:00 PM on the assigned due date (a sign-up sheet will be distributed a week prior to the due date). Early performances are encouraged. In preparing and performing keyboard exercises for this class, accuracy and the ability to think through the exercise is more important than playing quickly or in time.

Prepared Melodies and Rhythms (10%)

During the course of each unit, you will be assigned select melodies and rhythms from the textbook to learn and prepare at home (small homework assignments) which will then be performed during class. I will decide before arriving at class who I will have perform each exercise. The purpose of these assignments is to encourage you to regularly practice the associated skills and to monitor your progress. Unless indicated otherwise, you will sing melodies with scale degree numbers while conducting, and you will perform rhythms with Gordon syllables while conducting.

Incompletes

A grade of incomplete will be given only if the following conditions are met: 1) Near the end of the semester a severe illness or other catastrophe makes completing the semester's coursework impossible. 2) You request a grade of incomplete as soon as you realize that you will be unable to complete your coursework. 3) You are passing the course when you request the incomplete.
