Course Description: In Music 107/407P (Percussion Ensemble), students will study and perform percussion ensemble music from all eras. M107/407P is designed to promote a students development as a performer on percussion instruments, while also emphasizing stylistic interpretation and ensemble etiquette. Large and medium size conducted ensembles, as well as smaller non-conducted chamber ensembles, may be assigned, and students will present their work on a public concert at the conclusion of each semester. Studies in music of the 20th century will be especially significant. This is a performance-based class, and class sessions will be conducted in a professional level rehearsal environment.

Prerequisites: Instructor Approval is required.

Required Text: All necessary music will be provided by the instructor.

Course Requirements:

- 1. It is expected that all students who are enrolled in M107/407P will be present for every class during the semester. Excused absences may be granted in cases where student notifies the instructor a minimum of 24 hours in advance of the scheduled class. Excused absences are granted under exceptional circumstances only, which may include but is not limited to: illness, family emergencies, personal emergencies, HSU related travel, attendance at conferences related to major field of study, etc. Unexcused absences are not acceptable in M107/407P.
- 2. It is expected that all students enrolled in M107/407P display appropriate technical and musical development throughout the semester. This technical and musical development is directly related to the number of hours that students spend practicing and preparing for classes. An appropriate and rigorous practice regime is expected of all students enrolled in M107/407P.
- 3. All students enrolled in M107/407P are required to perform in one public performance at the end of the semester as listed on the Music Department Performance Calendar. Students with excessive absences, or those who have not attained a standard of proficiency required by the instructor, may be asked to perform in a role more appropriate to their level, or in extreme cases, may be instructed not to perform.

Grading Information & Classroom Policies:

- 1. The normal letter-grade matrix of "A" through "F" (including +/-) will be applied to all students enrolled in M107/407P. Grades will be based on the fulfillment of the course requirements, including: attendance, preparation, technical development, and musical development.
- 2. Incompletes for M107/407P will only be issued in exceptional circumstances. All considerations for a grade of Incomplete ("I") must be submitted in advance and in writing, and must be approved by the instructor.
- 3. Regular class attendance is expected of all students in M107/407P. Each unexcused absence will result in the lowering of the student's final course grade by one full letter grade. Three or more unexcused absences will result in the student receiving a grade of "F" for the semester.

Music 107/407P (Percussion Ensemble) provides an excellent medium for developing the area C objectives and learning outcomes. Through analysis, research, discussion, critique, and directed listening (musical examples), we will increase our vocabulary and expand our base of reference when discussing all music, and more specifically, percussion ensemble music. Through observation and participation, we will become more aware of the creative process, our reactions to it, and the relationships between life and art. Through the completion of this course, standards for the evaluation of our own and others' work will be developed and analyzed.

Music Department Student Learning Outcomes:

In addition, this course will contribute to the acquisition of skills and knowledge relevant to these Music Department (and National Association of Schools of Music) learning Outcomes:

- Students will demonstrate the ability to hear, identify, and work conceptually with the elements of music rhythm, melody, harmony, and structure.
- Students will demonstrate familiarity with, and an ability to perform a wide selection of musical literature representing principal eras, genres, and cultural sources.
- Students will demonstrate ability in performing areas appropriate to the student's needs, interests, and degree path.
- Students will demonstrate effective English writing skills.

M107/407P Course Specific Student Learning Outcomes:

- Students will rehearse literature from a variety of composers and styles, and will perform in at least one concert per semester.
- Students will practice and refine skills in rhythmic accuracy, intonation, balance, blend, dynamics, and phrasing.
- Students will build awareness and demonstrate knowledge of the many possible musical roles that are played by their individual part within a large ensemble, including primary material, secondary, tertiary, melodic, harmonic, rhythmic, etc.
- Students will develop skills to determine the musical role of their part within the context of the large group setting at any given time while rehearsing a composition, and make necessary musical adjustments according to that role.
- Students will make meaningful assessments of the quality of their own large ensemble
 performances through such activities as listening to the group's recordings, responding
 to conductor questions in rehearsal, completion of adjudication forms, and listening to
 and commenting upon performances by other ensembles.
- Students will apply to large ensemble rehearsals the relevant skills acquired in coursework in theory, ear training, music history, and studio lessons.
- Students will demonstrate understanding of aspects of musical performance that distinguish chamber music from large-group experiences (absence of a conductor, one-player-per-part independence) and will be able to implement strategies to address these issues in rehearsal and performance.
