Students will acquire and apply new skills on a daily basis. These skills are continually comprehensive; meaning new skills will require mastery of already learned skills. Students will be allowed 5 absences. After the second absence, the student's *total semester grade* will be lowered by half a letter grade *per absence* or five percentage points.   - 4. Harmonization: Improvise simple accompaniment on given

melody using mostly chords I and V chords.

- 5. Repertoire: I will be assigning you on regular bases solo piano pieces. You have to practice and prepare them for the next class.
- 6. Sight read simple solo and ensemble repertoire.
