Title: MUS 386L, Teaching Applied Keyboard

<u>Course description:</u> MUS 386L provides methods and materials for teaching class piano and private studio piano. MUS 386L is designed to provide the advance HSU Music Department piano students with the pedagogical skills necessary to develop a career as a keyboard teacher in any settings. Students will expend their pedagogical standards and keyboard repertoire under systematic supervision. Students will be learning about injury preventions and healthy practice habits.

Required materials and textbooks are going to be distributed in class. The standard assigned lesson time is 25 min and the pairs teacher/student will meet in agreeable for both sides time. Room 207 will be reserved for the lessons.

Attendance: Attendance for this class is <u>mandatory</u>. Your presence in the class is absolutely essential. Students will acquire and apply new skills on a daily basis. These skills are continually comprehensive; meaning new skills will require mastery of already learned skills. Students will be allowed 3 excused absences. Please inform me of any absences by email, phone, or in person *prior to class time*. If I don't hear from you, your absence will be unexcused. The excuse absences will be considered at the discretion of the instructor. Class time begins at the pre-agreed class time between the student and the teacher.

<u>Class Time:</u> Lessons and observations will meet at pre-agreed time arranged in the first week of classes by the instructor and the student. Students are expected to be on time and prepared for each lesson.
