In this class you will learn the rudiments of piano playing, as well as basic musicianship skills. Learning to play music is one of the great joys in life. Practice Expectations: 30-45 minutes a day is suggested. Practice rooms are available in Music A.. An access card is required, see me for the form. Since this class is open to music majors and non-music majors, there will be a higher level of expectation for those in the class who are music majors. You will be given slightly more difficult repertoire and technical exercises. Non-majors are welcome to prepare these assignments for extra credit.

In MUS 108K you will learn to:

1) Demonstrate a basic understanding of musical elements (rhythm, melody, harmony, structure, and notation).

2) Construct and perform various five finger patterns and root position triads in all major and minor keys over entire range of keyboard.

3) Play major scales beginning on white keys (CDGAE); two octaves. hands together in parallel motion.

4) Demonstrate an ability to improvise simple accompaniments on a given melody using I & V (tonic & dominant) chords in all major and minor keys.

5) Play assigned repertoire with fluency and careful observance of dynamics and articulation.

6) Sight read simple solo and ensemble repertoire.

7) Develop proper body mechanics and positioning at the keyboard to prevent injury.

We will be sequentially working through Units 1-9 in the textbook. Pacing will be determined by the needs of the class. Quiz dates will be announced in class.

Please keep in mind that questions and need for clarification will frequently arise in music learning. I urge all of you to feel free to speak to me before or after class, or send an email message, if you feel you may need assistance. I am always happy to collaborate with you to improve your experience!
